## HEAD

- 1. Where do we go to understand? -Search the scriptures
- Matthew 19:3-12 (cf Genesis 1:27; 2:18-25; Ephesians 5:31-32)
- 1 Corinthians 7:7-8,32-35 (the whole chapter if you have time!)
- 1 Corinthians 6:18-20
- Romans 1:16- 2:5 (This is a long passage but worthy of our study on this subject.)
- Luke 18:9-14

### HEART

- 2. What questions does this cause you to ask? -Acknowledge the struggle
- Does God reject me?
- Did God make me in a way that doesn't please him?
- Is my sin really that bad?
- Who I am, really?
- This issue makes me feel so confused about God.

- 3. How do the scriptures above help as you wrestle through your questions?

-Invite the Spirit into the mystery

#### What Chapel Hill's pastors have understood in our wrestling:

God created gender, male and female, and designed the two genders together for holy sexuality, either in celibacy or between one man and one woman in marriage. Both genders together display the image of God: different and unified; man and woman together sexually display the love that Christ has for the Church. Gender and sexuality are important matters of God's truth because God designed the unity in the diversity of the sexes to display the image of God to the world.

# **4. How can we talk about this with others?** -Practice the conversation



- A teenager of a friend of yours lets you know they're struggling with feeling attracted to someone of the same sex. What do you say?
- A widow in your small group is beginning to date again. They tell you they have plans to move in with this other person because it just makes financial sense. They're likely going to get married down the road. How will your group respond?

#### 5. Take it to the Lord in prayer.

Jesus, we come before you confessing our sin and our need for your forgiveness. Let us never forget that it was our sin that sent you to the cross. Have mercy on me, a sinner. I confess before you the ways that I have sinned by not living the holy sexuality you call me to. (Silent pause for confession.) We pray for those we love whose identity is not in you, Christ. Would our love and the abundant freedom that is ours in you draw them near to the community of faith. Would they call upon you as Lord and Savior. Would you rescue our friends, our family, and ourselves from a life of sin and set us free to walk new life with you. We ask in Jesus' name, Amen.
